LNG Expansion a Bum Deal for Northeastern PA

The December 17th Department of Energy report shows that increasing liquified natural gas (LNG) exports inarguably goes against the public interest. Further expansion would offer little benefit and great potential for harm to the environment, public health, and to the pockets of domestic utility customers.

Perhaps the most damning finding of the study is that pouring resources into increasing exports will most likely result in higher energy prices here at home. Residents of Northeastern PA, would be expected to pay extra for the privilege of having their neighborhoods - such as Dickson City - turned into LNG storage parks.

There must be more oversight of dangerous fracking wastewater in Pennsylvania

"There is no oversight," says Robert Green, who works in southwestern Pennsylvania in an industry that insures that pipelines can appropriately handle the complex and often hazardous fuels and waste streams they contain.

"No state agency has authority over how these wastewater pipelines are constructed, operated and monitored, not Pennsylvania's Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), or the state's Public Utility Commission, and as a result there are no standards," says David Hess, who led DEP from 2001 to 2003.

In one fracking wastewater pipeline failure that occurred in 2022, 18,000 gallons of waste spilled from a pipeline operated by Seneca Resources into a wooded landscape in Cameron County contaminating the water well of John Rosenberger, a retired state trooper, and his wife Paige. The Rosenbergers were showering in dangerously toxic and radioactive fracking waste. It was very salty, he reported!

Disrupted place attachments and emotional energy geography in fracked Appalachia

PSR's own Christina DiGiulio along with Robin Hood, Martina Angela Caretta and Lora Snyder co-wrote a paper on the complicated ways that the fossil fuel industry can damage the emotional and physical connection to their home environment. The study focused on Appalachian areas where the good of residents has long been ignored for the sake of industry and energy extraction, and the system of marginalization and oppression that comes from treating these places as "sacrifice zones."

Solidarity Tour

In early December, much of our staff traveled to Pittsburgh to be in solidarity with impacted communities and celebrate environmental activism across the country. Taproot Earth, US Climate Action Network, and other partner organizations invited activists and community members from environmental justice communities across the country to build community, collective resistance, and unifying plans for future climate action.

We also participated in the <u>Community Sentinel Awards</u> for Environmental Stewardship hosted by FracTracker, where our own Chris DiGiulio was nominated. It was inspiring to be in a room with environmental activists and revolutionaries who, in some cases, are putting their lives on the line to fight for clean air, clean water, and the health of their communities.





The day before the award ceremony we hosted a solidarity tour around Southwest PA to witness the impact of polluting industry throughout the area. More than 30 of us loaded into a tour bus to visit a steel coke factory, a power plant, a landfill, and a well pad. We heard the stories of several local activists and impacted community members.

It was an important reminder and affirmation of just how important our work is. Ending the year with this week of coalition-building, celebration of our successes, and clarifying the work that still needs to be done was empowering.


East Coast premier of "Single-Use Planet" February 20th in Pittsburgh
